Summer Term 2024 – ‘Let’s Go! And Let’s Explore’

Welcome to the Summer Term! This term we will be exploring many different themes that reflect celebrations, transport and learning about our locality. Our learning will focus on knowledge and understanding of the world around us, supported by our systematic delivery of phonics and maths. Growth Mindset will underpin all of our teaching and learning experiences, ensuring that children understand and learn to use a range of effective learning skills.

As mathematicians we will:

- Develop our skills and knowledge of working with numbers up to 20 and beyond
- Learning about doubling, halving and sharing between equal groups
- Looking at symmetry through artwork
- Further embedding our recall of number bonds
- Learning the names and features of some 3d shapes
- Correctly form, and orientate, numerals 0-9
- Identify odd and even numbers

Vocabulary: number, more, less, equal, pattern, count, add, take away, equals, part-part-whole, share, double, half, shapes, faces

As readers and writers we will:

- Experience a rich variety of texts linked to our learning themes.
- Learn new phoneme / grapheme correspondences and apply this to reading and writing in guided learning.
- Continue to apply our phonics skills to reading books at school and at home.
- Continue to use our phonic knowledge to make independent attempts at writing words, phrases and simple sentences.
- Continue to work on the correct formation of all letters and know the letter names.

Vocabulary: Fred talk, Fred in your head, boat words, wet words, sky words, special friends, blend

Learning Theme: ‘The Train Ride’

- Know about some different modes of transport.
- Know how to read simple maps including keys.
- Know the difference between old and new trains and talk about the differences.
- Explain how magnets work and explore push and pull forces.

Vocabulary: journey, meadow, mare, foal, tunnel, engine, lighthouse, seaside,

repeating, rhyming

Suggested Texts: The Train Ride, On the Way Home, Lost and Found, The Way Back Home, Oi! Get Off Our Train

Learning Theme: Paris Olympics 2024

- To know what the Olympics are and some of the history of the events
- To identify where the United Kingdom, France and Greece are on a world map
- To be able to explain what makes a good sportsperson—winning and losing graciously
- To be resilient, empathic and willing to have a go at new things.
- To know what it means to work as part of a team
- To use ordinal numbers to talk about first, second and third finishers

Vocabulary: Olympics, competition, continents, countries, winning, losing, sportsmanship, resilience, empathy

Learning Theme: ‘Naughty Bus’

- Know about mechanical features such as axels and wheels.
- Know about prepositional language such as over, through, behind, etc
- Sequence the key events from the story using sequential language such as first, next, then ...
- Produce our own ideas for story telling

Vocabulary: London, traffic, important, passengers, reflection, handsome, rescue, powerful, winch, promise,

Suggested Texts: All About the London Bus, You Can’t Take an Elephant on The Bus,

Learning Theme: ‘Our Locality’

Core Texts: ‘The Wild Woods’, ‘Sharing a Shell’, ‘Sally and the Limpet’

- Know about some of the geography of our local area
- Understand some similarities and differences between different landscapes such as the woods, the moors and the beach
- Read and create simple maps to show our knowledge of the local area
- Identify features of different local landscapes
- To explore the natural world around us and make observations.
- To know some similarities and differences between where we live and a contrasting environment.
- To know about some of the ways we can impact the environment.
- To understand the impact of pollution on our environment.
- To learn about what we can do to look after our environment and protect the people, plants and animals which live here.

Vocabulary: local, area, village, town, farms, woods, moors, beach, map, key, similarities, differences, environment, pollution, impact, recycling, litter, a variety of beach and ocean animal names. **Vocabulary for ‘The Wild Woods’:** Wild Woods, forest, habitat, tree, branch, waterfall, whispered, sighed. **Vocabulary for ‘Sharing a Shell’:** share, gull, scuttle, roaming, anemone, jaws, tentacle, romping, bristle worm, housework, rollicking, ungrateful, slave, peace, shy, whelk, rocketing. **Vocabulary for ‘Sally and the Limpet’:** beach, ocean, sea, underwater, rock pool, compare,

Suggested Texts: Farmer Duck, Rosie’s Walk, Commotion in the Ocean, Billy’s Bucket, The Highstreet, Where’s my Teddy, The Gruffalo, Not a Stick, Sharing a Shell, The Snail and The Whale, Tiddler, Dear Greenpeace, A House for Hermit

In PSHE we will:

Follow the Jigsaw scheme and will cover the topics:

- Relationships
- Changing Me

We will continue to learn about self-regulation and managing our big feelings.

During this term we will be celebrating The Paris Summer Olympics with a collaboration between Manor Primary School and Ugborough Primary School.
